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Purpose of the Order of the Arrow

- To recognize those who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives and by such recognition cause others to conduct themselves in a way that warrants similar recognition.
- To promote camping, responsible outdoor adventure, and environmental stewardship as essential components of every Scouts' experience in the unit, year-round, and in summer camp.
- To develop leaders with the willingness, character, and ability to advance the activities of their units, Scouting, and our nation.
- To crystallize the Scout habit of helpfulness into a life purpose of leadership in cheerful service to others.

Role of an OA Member - Lodge

The responsibility of an OA Member to their lodge can be simply put as an obligation to be active in lodge events and activities, yet there is so much more. In saying the obligation, an OA Member devotes themselves to others. In service to your unit, you are serving our lodge. In service to your chapter, you are serving our lodge. As The Brotherhood of Cheerful Service, any service done for the betterment of Scouting and our communities benefits our lodge.

As an OA Member the first thing one must do is pay their annual dues. This is required to attend any of our lodge events. Next is to stay active! The best way to do that is simply by showing up at lodge events. These events are weekend campouts where OA Members will meet other OA Members from around the council! The events' information is on our website: Wa-hi-nasa.org. Lastly, if a youth lodge member wishes to further their leadership experience, they may apply to serve as a chairman on the Lodge Executive Committee.

Role of an OA Member - Chapter



Our lodge is divided into separate chapters based on the district they are located in. Each Chapter has a team of elected youth officers similar to the lodge. A chapter adviser is also appointed by the associated district. Chapters run alongside the lodge to push along programs and communication.

Chapters serve the lodge and district in many different capacities. Chapters many purposes throughout the year conducting unit elections and performing camp promotion visits. Chapters also assist in service projects, camporees, and callout ceremonies. The chapters main purpose is serving the units within the district.

The Chapter is the most effective way to get involved in the lodge. The first step is attending monthly chapter meetings. The times of these meetings are located on the website and in this booklet. Another method of getting involved with the chapter is providing service and assisting with unit elections. In summary, the chapter is a local and easy way to begin your involvement within our Order.

Role of an OA Member - Unit

Since we, as OA Members, were selected by our peers in our units for the honor of being members of the OA, it is our chief responsibility to provide service to our unit. While the Order provides a number of opportunities that can enhance a Scouts experience within the BSA program, it is expected that each Arrowman bring those experiences back to their unit. The OA Unit Representative has a large role in this responsibility because it is their job to bring information from the Order of the Arrow back to their units so that other scouts can be involved when they become eligible. In doing this, the OA Unit Representative strengthens the mission of the lodge and purpose of the OA. Now that you have been inducted into the Order of the Arrow, continue to broaden your horizons by accepting a higher responsibility in the lodge, take an OA High Adventure excursion, become a Brotherhood member. Butdon't forget those in your unit who thought highly enough of you to elect you into the OA, because they need your support.



OA Levels

You may have seen some OA Members with different-looking sashes like ones with two bars or a triangle. These are the membership levels of the OA. They should not be thought of as ranks to achieve, but instead recognitions of an OA Member's commitment to brotherhood, cheerfulness, and service.

Ordeal

The sash bears one of the important symbols of the OA, an arrow worn across the right shoulder. This shows everyone that you are a member of the OA and marks you as a Scout that has been recognized by your peers for your service.



Brotherhood

Brotherhood is denoted by two bars above and below the arrow on the sash. It can be attained 6 months after your ordeal and will recognize your further commitment to the OA and test your knowledge of its tokens. It is something every OA Member should earnestly strive for to seal their induction.



Vigil Honor

The Vigil Honor is denoted by a triangle in the center of the arrow as well as the two bars on both ends of the sash. This is an honor given to OA Members after two years of exceptional cheerful service after their Brotherhood ceremony. A vigil class is chosen each year by a lodge committee and with the approval of the national Order of the Arrow committee. The lodge can only award one Vigil honor per 50 members.



Lodge Executive Committee

The Lodge Executive Committee (LEC) is the governing body that handles administrative and functional duties of the Wa-Hi-Nasa Lodge. The LEC consists of youth leaders and adult advisers. The lodge officers are elected by youth lodge membership and manage teams of appointed youth in their respective areas. On the chapter level, there is a Chapter Chief elected by the youth chapter members. These positions combined make up the LEC. Only youth LEC members (under 21) have the ability to vote on lodge matters. They do that at LEC meetings which happen at the end of most major lodge events. If you'd like to attend one of



these meetings to see what they're like, you're more than welcome. The Lodge Executive Committee is looking for members to join and help in all areas. Are you interested in serving in the trading post, or you like technology and would like to help the website team, or enjoy brain-

storming fun activities for events on the program team? Maybe you enjoy theater or drama and would be interested in ceremonies. There's something for every youth and adult to get involved. If you're interested in any of these areas you can talk to the people who manage them. Their pictures are in this publication after all. Why don't you ask them about their position?

Belt Buckle Awards

At each Wa-Hi-Nasa lodge event, there are various areas where an OA Member can serve. Some of these areas will award Belt Buckles to those who dedicate their time in a specific area over multiple events. Earning one of these buckles is a prestigious feat. <u>It should be noted these are subject to change at the June Induction Weekend LEC.</u>



Ceremonies - Youth First, demonstrate, through performance, a thorough grasp of the essentials on how to conduct an effective ceremony. Second, know a complete part of a principle in an official ceremony of the Order of the Arrow (Pre-Ordeal,

Ordeal, Brotherhood). Lastly, perform from memory as part of a ceremonies team, in least eight ceremonies. Ceremonies may be Pre-Ordeal, Ordeal, or Brotherhood.

Adult - Serve at least 30 hours to the lodge ceremonies committee.



Elangomat - An OA Member can earn this Belt Buckle by serving as an Elangomat at 5 Inductions.



Trading Post - This belt buckle can be earned by serving faithfully with the Trading Post staff for 5 events with the approval of the Trading Post Chair and Adviser.



Kitchen - This belt buckle is awarded after an OA Member has served in the kitchen at 5 lodge events.



Registration - An OA Member can earn this belt buckle after serving on registration staff for 5 events.



Service Crew -An OA Member can earn this belt buckle after serving on service crew for 5 events.




