

# Arrowmen Receive Ph.D.

Two Wa-Hi-Nasa members successfully completed the requirements for the Order of the Arrow University doctorate degree. This accomplishment reflects a three-year commitment to lodge training and personal development. Only four Wa-Hi-Nasa Arrowmen have ever finished the program providing evidence of the significance of this particular undertaking and their resolution to lodge service. Boyd Williams of Franklin, Tennessee and Bill Schwartz of Columbia, Tennessee both completed their personal quest for knowledge in 2002. Boyd became active in the lodge as a youth officer and currently serves as the Nendawen Chapter Adviser. Schwartz has just finished a stint as the Lodge Trading Post Adviser that lasted several years and grossed substantial revenues for the lodge program. Boyd and Bill join 2001 recipients Jim Reed and Gary Mueller.

To complete the doctorate program participants must earn a bachelor's and master's degree requiring a year each. The doctorate program requires at least a year depending on the individual's commitment to completion. The program involves training sessions and hands-on simulations at O.A.U., held each March in Smyrna, Tennessee. Additionally, the participant must undertake several projects on their own including reading, reflection, goal setting, and outreach to inactive lodge members. Ph.D. participants play an active role in shaping their own curriculum in a way that will benefit both themselves and the lodge. Boyd Williams attended the fellowship of a neighboring lodge where he noted several program ideas for Wa-Hi-Nasa. Schwartz wrote an analysis in which he recounted an OA unit election "gone bad" and how to eliminate such problems in the future.

To date only the 4 adults (Reed, Mueller, Williams, and Schwartz) have successfully completed the evolving O.A.U. Ph.D. program. The race to become the first youth OA Doctor is still on at the next OAU held


morning and reviewing our strategy
