Wewoapisak:



Adviser's Corner with Chancellor Bob Corlew



The legendary film-maker Walt Disney once said. "All our dreams can come true if we have the courage to pursue them." Like Disney, our Order is in the business of making dreams come true for young people. The opportunities which the Order of the Arrow offers to young men is limited only by the amount of creativity and the amount of hard work which we as adult advisers and the youth whom we advise are willing to put forth. Please note a couple of important words in Disney 's quote. He didn't say, "Your dreams will come true." Disney suggests that our dreams can come true. These two little words draw an extremely important distinction. First. is the difference between will and can. Will suggests a certainty. If you work hard, your dreams will come true suggests an absolute which isn't always true in life, and candidly isn't true in our Order. Nonetheless, the fact that our dreams can come true should suggest to us the great opportunities we have to provide for the youth of our Order and the youth who perhaps one day might be among our numbers. Second, and perhaps less obvious in nature, is the distinction between you and our. As adults, we have the obligation to help advise and point the youth leaders in the right direction. It is not the role of adult advisers to do the work for the youth. But rather, it is the role, and even our duty, to support the youth decisions and to help them be successful in light of the decisions which are made. Certainly the decisions made should not be those where the youth leaders dominate the decision without the input of their adult leaders, nor should it be that the decisions are made by the adults and then imposed upon the youth Adults who are not placed in leadership positions for the following years should never belittle their own roles in our Lodge and in their local chapters. Part of our duty as leaders is to develop new leaders, and give them new responsibilities so they can learn and develop as leaders, so thev can better serve our Lodge, our chapters, and most of all, the youth.

Candidly, I would observe that our chapters and our Lodge are sorely in need of new faces and leaders who will answer to the call of our youth. And who will assist our youth in developing our Lodge and our Chapters into an even better and stronger organization. Perhaps it might be good for us to back all the way up the beginning. What is the purpose of our Order? Is it strictly to provide fun and educational opportunities for the youth? I would suggest that our role is much larger. We certainly have a duty to our elected members. Our duty further extends to the promotion of camping in general, and appreciation of the heritage that has made our Order great. We also have a duty to those youth who are not yet members of our Order. Our duty even extends to those who are not Boy Scouts. By appearing, when called upon to do so we help our Council better serve the youth of middle Tennessee. We help the youth involved in Cub Scouting want to be Boy Scouts. By assisting troops with camp promotions, we help the boys in the troops increase the desire to camp and to participate in fun, educational activities at Camp Boxwell. Certainly, we need to emphasize to Scoutmasters the opportunities which the Order can provide to the troops, but the role of the OA Troop Representative is key in our relationship with units and their leaders. Just as significantly, however, we need to ensure that we are prepared to deliver, when we are called upon. In order to do this, we should reemphasize our role within the chapters to provide camp promotions and unit elections in every unit which has persons eligible to go to camp and to become members of our Order. When we cultivate the attitudes among the scoutmasters and other unit leaders who serve in the Order and then complement the activities of the troop or crew, we encourage them to remain active in scouting and active in their local unit. Further, we should emphasize the important role of the chapters in making our Lodge strong. The cliche, "A chain is only as strong as its weakest link," has some application to our Order. The Lodge cannot be strong when there are weak chapters that do not adequately serve the needs of the local units in particular areas. Similarly the worn out saying, "The tail should not wag the dog, should remind us that the duty of the Chapters is to be strong in the local communities but to first and foremost support the Lodge. If we are not fulfilling our roles, isn't it time we recognize that the success of our dreams rests upon our courage to pursue those dreams? (Remember courage is part

of Disney's quote.) I would suggest that for us, courage to make our Lodge greater comes in the form of nines: 1.) Perseverance 2.) Putting the order before personal goals, 3.) Making positive contributions of time and effort, 4) Engaging in constant communication while refraining from negative correspondence 5.) Rethinking the activities that we offer 6.) Serving all of the youth including youth that we now have among our numbers, will have, and those who participate in the Boy Scout program alone 7.) Establishing the logistics dealings with our events with alternate plans for foreseeable obstacles 8.) Positively promoting those activities, and 9.)Evaluate the event after the fact so that it can be changed where necessary . Our Lodge can better serve those needs when we do all we can to serve Scouting because Scouting is a program that teaches youth how to be more efficient in their lives. Although we in the Order are striving to do all these things, I challenge you the individual. Do you have the courage to pursue our dreams? It can the be concluded that our dreams for our Order can only come true when we have the courage to work together in pursuit of them so that we can achieve the great principals espoused by our Order and by Scouting.
