Brothers,



## Adviser's Corner



### SALT

On July 31, the last night of the National Conservation and Leadership Seminar, I had the opportunity to listen to our National Chief speak. In his speech, he related a story about the importance of salt to the human race.

Here is my twist on the story and how it relates to our lodge.

Salt is a major ingredient that is used to

season our food. When we use salt to season our food, it usually takes several shakes to spread multiple granules of salt onto the food. Everyone's tastes are different, so not everyone will require the same amount of salt to provide the added seasoning to satisfy their taste buds.

In the early days, Salt was used to preserve foods. Early settlers did not have the convenience of cold storage from refrigerators or freezers as we have today. They would use an abundance of salt to cover their meat to preserve it for later consumption.

Salt can help to improve the taste of your food. It can also be used with water to create a mouthwash for sores you may have in your mouth. Simply rinse your mouth out with this salt and water solution to expedite and improve your oral health.

We have identified three attributes of Salt: 1. it seasons, 2. it preserves, 3. it improves. So how is salt related to our lodge? Why is it important to our lodge? Do we need salt in the lodge? Do we have salt in the lodge?

Consider each member a granule of salt. We need salt for the same reasons mentioned above. We need to constantly season our younger members for them to one day lead the lodge and chapters as youth officers and chairmen. Seasoned older arrowmen can provide help in continuing this seasoning process.

We need salt to continue to preserve our values not only in our Lodge and Chapters but also in Scouting and our Society. Our values must be maintained and passed on in our future.

Every year we should not be complacent to just do what was done the year before. We should strive to improve on what we did last year.

Salt is comprised of tiny individual granules and one granule is a start, but will not provide enough to recognize a huge difference, however, when we use multiple granules of salt, we begin to realize a difference and see results.

I challenge you to band together like salt and help season our lodge, work to preserve our values, and participate to improve our lodge and the members in it.

## ArrowCorps<sup>5</sup>

Are you looking for a once in a lifetime service learning fun adventure for the summer of 2008? Then you need to check out ArrowCorps<sup>5</sup>. It is the largest service project ever undertaken by the Boy Scouts of America to date. Five thousand arrowmen will blaze trails, remove invasive species, restore natural habitats, and perform other conservation related projects at five of the United States most beautiful National Forests. The selected Forests are: George Washington and Jefferson National Forests in Virginia, Mark Twain National Forest in Missouri, Bridger-Teton National Forest in western Wyoming, Manti-La Sal National Forest in southeastern Utah, and Shasta-Trinity National Forest in northern California. One thousand arrowmen will work at each park during the summer for one week. Each park has specific projects that will improve its natural beauty and ecosystems.

Is work the only thing to do? No! One day of the action packed week has been set aside for recreation. Some recreational activities include fishing, canoeing, white-water rafting, horse-back riding, hiking, and touring local historical sites. A fun time has been promised by each site commissioner.

Wa-Hi-Nasa has looked at going as a lodge to the George Washington and Jefferson National Forests. Combined, both forests stretch from on end of Virginia to the other. They cover 1.8 million acres of land. Thanks to ArrowCorps<sup>5</sup> five miles of horse trail will be added to these forests, invasive plants will be removed, minor trail will be refurbished, and a new trail leading for the parks marina to the ocean will be constructed. ## Blazing Ordeal in August

### *105 degrees and new 105 members clean up Boxwell*

Strange lodge fact: The Fall Ordeal is really in mid-August.

Wa-Hi-Nasa lodge had one the hottest and safest ordeals in several years on August 10-12 at Boxwell Scout Reservation. Ranger Steve Belew said that the 3 camps could not be cleaned up and closed without the help of both the candidates and members. Ranger Steve also stated "that he and council appreciate all the work of so many arrowmen!"

In lingo of one summer camp staffer "the plats were tilted, the mats were stored and the cots were moved" For those not so familiar with summer camp take down there is a lot to do. Over 830 wooden tent platform need to be tilted and have a heavy concrete block placed under it. A regular tent platform may weigh as much as 80 pounds. Over 890 canvas tents are checked and folded correctly before being stored. Over 1500 steel & thick plywood cots weighing over 40 pounds also must be stored.

The ceremony bug has really bitten the chapters between the council office in Nashville and Boxwell. All three chapters that performed so well at the Fall Ordeal are in the zone east of the council office the fine chapters that did so well are Hermitage, Cherokee and Walton Trail.
