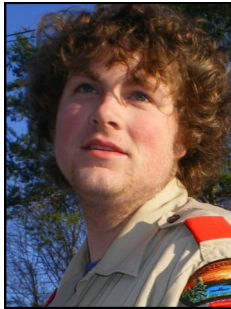
Dear Brothers,
