The 2015 NOAC will be held from August 3-8, 2015 at Michigan State University in East Lansing, Michigan, and will celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Order of the Arrow. Arrowmen can travel to NOAC with a contingent from their lodge, or as a staff member supporting the thousands of Arrowmen attending in the conference.



Advisers Corners



As my trail of serving as Lodge adviser comes to an end I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for the support to the Lodge and me over the past 2 years. I have been fortunate to serve as adviser for 2 good chiefs, each having different focus and skill sets. Hunter moved on to serve as Section Vice Chief and TJ winning National and Section recognition in Ceremonies. This continued Wa-Hi-Nasa's tradition of service and recognition beyond the Lodge. Their combined leaderships brought Wa-Hi-Nasa's Quest for the Golden Arrow streak to 4 in a row and the first

Overall Ceremonies Winner in recent memory. .

Over the past 2 years my claim to fame has been the recognition as "the Lodge Adviser for the National Chairman" and this year as "the National Chief & Chairman." Wa-Hi-Nasa is proud of both of their accomplishments and their service to the Order. Historically this is the first time in OA history that both the National Chief and National Chairman have been from the same Lodge. What timing this has been to coincide with WA-Hi-NASA's 75th anniversary celebration.

Wa-Hi-Nasa's 75th celebration served as a central theme for all Lodge events throughout the year, with cake and ice cream to boot. Returning of long time and former members over the year has highlighted our events and emphasized the role played by the Lodge in their lives. Part of the celebration included of all things, multiple flaps. The LEC approved 3 flaps with proceeds from 2 of these going to establish a High Adventure Scholarship Trust. Funding from this Trust provided 2 scholarships to Arrowmen this year, one to Seabase & one to Philmont. The driving force for this new program is to have the participants return and passing on the knowledge, skills and experiences they gained on their trek to others. Future funding of these scholarships is secure with a potential of multiple scholarships offered per year.

The lodge building itself has a fresh look as the porch and front were upgraded. These projects would have not been completed or possible without the private, council, and sweat equality donations that were put into them. These improvements in conjunction with the new roof should serve brothers for years to come. We are fortunate to have one of the most unique, picturesque, and OA designated structures in the country. All of this is possible due to the relationship and bond between our council and the Lodge. Continuing to insure this strong relation exists will continue going forward will be beneficial to all. Winter camp, for one, would not exist without such cooperative efforts.

Most of you know I went through an Ordeal in 1968 and had very little contact with the Lodge until my son entered scouting, it was a deer in the headlights thing. My Ordeal consisted working, little to no communication of what was going on and then we went home without any interaction with the membership. Our lodge has made a great step forward away from my experience to urge retention and return of new members. By simply changing the ceremonies' to allow for a brotherhood dinner with interaction between new and experienced members has increased the percentage of new Arrowman returning for the next event. The next step is being sure we get them engaged in some capacity with the activities when they return. It is encouraging to see the new, clean sashes at events.

With the end of my trail Bobby Brown starts his trek. Our support of him will ensure his success and place in Lodge history.

What is "unselfish service"?

Our OA service is consistent with the Boy Scout Oath: to help other people at all times. It is also consistent with the Scout Law: A Scout is ... helpful. In our Troop meetings, we repeat these words and concepts every week, and by the time a Scout attains the rank of Eagle, it has been repeated several hundred times. By that time, the Eagle Scout is dedicated to being helpful and to help other people at all times.

Our obligation includes an extra dimension to the concept of being helpful, that of being unselfish. Being unselfish in service and devotion to the welfare of others. Unselfish includes providing service, not to attain a rank or getting credit for your work, but just for the sake of serving. After an Order of the Arrow event, I share with others the power and inspiration I receive from hearing OA members promise to be unselfish in service and devotion to the welfare of others. The obligation turns up the notch of service to others by several levels.

In the world outside of Scouting and the Order, unselfishness is almost an unknown trait. It is a foreign concept to most people. I feel honored and humbled by the spirit I see in my fellow Arrowmen.

How can we achieve this in our service to the lodge and to our units in 2014? Make a resolution to continue providing service at the troop, chapter and lodge level. Look for opportunities for service in your community. Plan to support unit elections in your chapter, and encourage elected Scouts to attend Spring or Fall Ordeal. Attend the ordeals and work as an Elangomat or in some other supporting role.

We need you to step up. Our country needs you. Your community needs you. The Lodge needs you. I look forward to working with you to make 2014 a great year for Wa-Hi-Nasa.
