### **Adviser's Corner**


We are the Brotherhood of Cheerful Service.

After Robert Baden-Powell founded the Boy Scout movement in England, it was brought to the United States in 1910. In 1915, E. Erner Goodman and Carroll A. Edson co-founded the Order of the Arrow. During the last five years, we have celebrated the 100th Anniversary of these great youth leadership organizations.

I share with you two quotes from the past: In his final letter to the Scouts, Baden-Powell wrote:

"I have had a most happy life and I want each one of you to have a happy life too. I believe that God put us in this jolly world to be happy and enjoy life. Happiness does not come from being rich, nor merely being successful in your career, nor by self-indulgence. One step towards happiness is to make yourself healthy and strong while you are a boy,



Later, E. Erner Goodman wrote...

"The Order of the Arrow is a 'thing of the spirit' rather than of mechanics. Organization, operational procedure, and paraphernalia are necessary in any large and growing movement, but they are not what count in the end. The things of the spirit count: Brotherhood, in a day when there is too much hatred at home and abroad; Cheerfulness, in a day when the pessimists have the floor; Service, in a day when millions are interested only in getting or grasping rather than giving."

I cannot think of words more appropriate than these voices from the past for living today and striving to be a better person. I hope you will follow and consider some of these thoughts which should help us to "seek a higher vision". Remember the Admonition. ~ Bobby W. Brown, Lodge Adviser

# Tom Parker Memorial Award For Excellence in Service to Camping
