December 28, 2015: Wa-Hi-Nasa Arrowman Hunter Jones was elected National Chief of the Order of the Arrow.

An Eagle Scout from Troop 405 in Lafayette, TN, Jones has served in a number of positions in the lodge. He was elected to serve as Lodge Secretary in 2011. As editor of the Flying Eagle, he produced quality newsletters and other communications for the Lodge.

In 2012 he was elected to serve as Lodge Chief and in 2013, Jones was motivated to serve on the Section level and was elected to the position of Section Vice-Chief. He served in this role for three terms, leading the program of three Section Conclaves, impacting hundreds of Arrowmen. When he ran for Section Chief at the 2015 Section Conclave, there were no other candidates who could match his leadership credentials and experience of service to the Section.

Chewalee Chapter Goes to Florida

On Saturday, February 27, 2016, Alpha Phi Omega (APO), a service fraternity that includes many current and former Scouts and Order of the Arrow (OA) members, recently hosted their annual Merit Badge University (MBU) at Florida Institute of Technology (Florida Tech) in the Melbourne, Florida area (Manatee District, Central Florida Council). This was accomplished through a collaboration of supporting volunteers including many Merit Badge Counselors from the local area.

Although there were many merit badges offered, a favorite was the Radio merit badge, which is usually taught and supported by members of the Platinum Coast Amateur Radio Society (PCARS) who are often Scouters and members of the Tipisa OA Lodge and / or Florida Tech alumni. In completing the Radio merit badge requirements, a Scout must carry on radio contact with another station. That's where the Chewalee Chapter comes in: to provide some long distance Cheerful Service by being a distant station (among others) included as a radio communications contact.

Chapter members Luke Boruff and Jesse Franklin talked with nineteen Scouts that completed their merit badge with a little help from Chewalee. Luke is currently the Chewalee Chapter Chief and is studying to earn an Amateur Radio License while Jesse Franklin, a long time Chewalee Arrowman and future K2BSA 2017 National Jamboree Staff Member holds the Amateur Radio Station License, KK4ZNT.

Communication occurred using a highly technical method whereby Scouts talked via smartphone over the Internet to a special radio station in Melbourne, Florida which then transmitted and received signals from a repeater perched on a hospital centrally located to the city and then via radio to the portable stations located on Florida Tech's campus.

Kudos to our Chewalee Chapter OA brothers who also plan to operate the K2BSA during the 2017 SR-6 Section Conclave to be held at Boxwell Reservation. Please visit our Chewalee brothers at Conclave or if you can't wait, they plan to have installation trials during the upcoming Wa-Hi-Nasa Spring Ordeal and a dryrun of the operation at the Wa-Hi-Nasa Fall Fellowship. Currently the Chewalee Chapter plans on the dryrun to be at the Howard B. Olson OA Lodge.

Growing up on the farm, my parents and others would say, "Remember where you came from," or "Remember your raisin'." Now as an adult, the question I might hear is, "Do you know where you are going?" The first twenty-five members of the Order have grown to almost 200,000 in that time. The Order of the Arrow is recognized by the BSA as a force in the Scouting community.

At the local level, our Lodge began in 1938 at Camp Boxwell with the induction of eight scouts. Our Lodge legacy has continued and is recognized as one of the strongest lodges in the country. From that eight has grown to almost 1,000 members connected with the Middle Tennessee Council.

Where did we come from? At the national and local level, we grew

from a small group with a simple goal of being the Brotherhood of Cheerful Service. That is a pretty big aspiration. Being a brotherhood means that we care about each other. Cheerful Service means that we continue to work together to serve the BSA, our Council and Districts, and our communities by following two of the parts of the Scout promise – being helpful and friendly. Consistent with "having a cheerful spirit in the midst of irksome tasks and weighty responsibilities".

And if there was any century when we needed that attribute or cheerfulness in our lives, it is this one, seems to me. But when we know how, by our example more than our words, for people to be happy. We've got something that the world needs.'

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Summit, Arrowmen are required to be between the ages of 14-17.

My only regret in the Order of the Arrow is that I did not attend one of these high adventure programs sooner. I went to Sea Base with the OA at 19 and I went to Philmont at 20. I left the programs and wanted to do them again. I encourage each and every Arrowmen to attend an Order of the Arrow High Adventure program.
