Incoming Chiefly Speaking

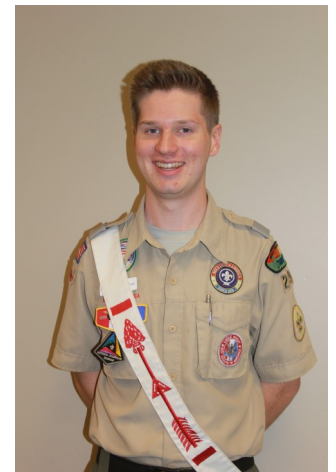

that we serve in every day.

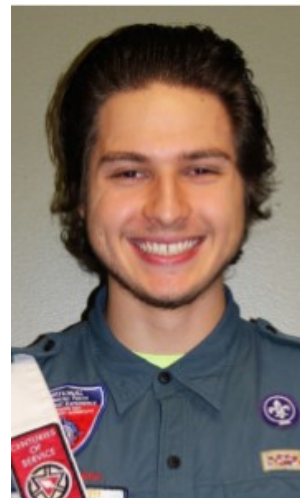
