The damaged and rotten ones went to the compound for rebuilding. What our **Obedient** members were told to do was "salvage all the lumber & nails you could". "Save the nails too?" was asked. The answer was yes to the save the nails because the camp wasn't wasting expensive nails. Nails were pulled with claw hammers and naturally, the hammer handles were broken. Candidates were hammering old rusty nails out straight for reuse. Some candidates and members were using just the hammer head since they had broken the cheap camp hammer handles to make the nails reusable. This unskilled and under managed crews was moving slowly on a project that needed to be completed at the Spring Ordeal. There were a lot of plats to be fixed and more arriving on trailers all morning long. The camp needed these rebuilt plats in 8 days for summer camp.

The one adult using the circular saw had limited experience. The replacement boards were being reattached with recycled nails and bending before they could be completely driven in. The youths hammering had little experience with a hammer. The 2x4 plat joist was being missed about half the time. "Oh for a chalk line" one adult grumbled. The project was going nowhere fast. We needed an adult who knew something about carpentry and we needed him now!

Almost by divine providence, one small frustrated candidate broke silence! His youthful squeaky voice said - Go find an adult "from his troop to get some crow bars before we break all the hammer handles." After being admonished for breaking silence we

started the search for this adult candidate referred to as "Who brings crow bars to an ordeal?".

This raised several questions why does one carry around numerous crow bars? The legendary Howard Olson said with a hint of humorous sarcasm "What is he a cat burglar or one man wrecking crew"

After an exhaustive reservation wide search before cell phones and radios, we found him cleaning shower houses. We went to his truck to get the crow bars. For the next 5 years he was our lead adult on anything to do with building platforms.

It was at this ordeal our lodge discovered of how we could better use the talents of our members and plan the work that would make our lodge be of even greater service for decades to come.

Arrowmen appreciate camp and values it teaches. We show this appreciation by our lodge's service in many repairs and construction projects at all the Council's properties. By knowing our members and candidates we have been able to make camp better. By knowing your resources beforehand, you can work smarter and not harder.


Excellence in Ceremonies - This award recognizes a youth member that has greatly contributed to any ceremony team by performing at district or lodge events.
